Report on the implementation by Saudi Arabia of Security Council resolutions 1874 (2009) and 2094 (2013) concerning the Democratic People's Republic of Korea

Introduction

Saudi Arabia implements all Security Council resolutions adopted under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations. Such resolutions are implemented by a national committee that is composed of the relevant competent authorities. Those authorities have instructed their relevant units to take the measures required to implement Security Council resolutions 1874 (2009) and 2094 (2013), in accordance with the procedures that are followed for all such resolutions.

Procedures followed by the competent authorities

With a view to ensuring their rapid implementation, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs informs all members of the national committee of any resolution the Security Council adopts and provides them with the text thereof. That committee may also call a meeting to discuss how to implement and follow up such a resolution.

The competent Saudi Arabian authority has stated that, with regard to civil aviation, there are no transactions or direct shipments between North Korea and Saudi Arabia.

The competent Saudi Arabian authority has instructed all land, sea and air border points to scrutinize all shipments from and to North Korea, as well as shipments passing through Saudi Arabian territory, in order to ensure that they do not contain items, equipment or goods that violate the relevant Security Council resolutions. It has also included in the list of suspects the names of those nationals of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea who appear in the sanctions lists, while the entities have been added to the "do not transact business with" blacklist of the customs computer system.

The competent authority has circulated the above-mentioned resolutions to all ports for implementation. It should be noted that the North Korean-flagged ship that docks at Jeddah Islamic Port only carries livestock.

The competent authority has also instructed all of its subsidiary authorities and the Saudi Council of Chambers to take the measures required to implement the requirements of annex II, paragraph 2, concerning companies and annex IV concerning luxury goods.

In addition, the competent authority has informed all banks and licensed exchange bureaus of the resolutions. The banks and exchange bureaus indicated that they have no relations and do not conduct business with North Korea or its nationals. They also indicated that they have added North Korea to the list of high-

risk States. The competent authority has also stressed to all banks and licensed exchange bureaus that they must take heed of all that is issued by the relevant authorities and take all necessary preventive measures.

Following are some of the measures taken by the competent authorities in Saudi Arabia:

The names of 12 nationals of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea have been included in the list of persons who are prohibited from entering Saudi Arabia and subject to a travel ban (see enclosure) pursuant to Security Council resolutions [1817 \(2006\)](#), [1874 \(2009\)](#) and [2094 \(2013\)](#).

The Government of Saudi Arabia has informed the relevant Government authorities and the private sector of the resolutions' provisions, so that they might comply with them. The Government would like to inform the Security Council Committee that it has instructed the relevant Government authorities to implement the requirements of the resolutions that are set out in the following paragraphs:

- Paragraph 17, in which the Security Council requires any State that has been refused by a vessel to allow an inspection to promptly report the incident;
- Paragraph 19, in which the Council requests all States to communicate any information available on transfers of aircraft or vessels to other companies in order to evade the sanctions set out in resolutions [1718 \(2006\)](#), [1874 \(2009\)](#), [2087 \(2013\)](#) or [2094 \(2013\)](#), including renaming or re-registering of aircraft, vessels or ships;
- Paragraph 26, in which the Council calls upon all States to supply information at their disposal regarding non-compliance with the measures imposed in resolutions [1718 \(2006\)](#), [1874 \(2009\)](#), [2087 \(2013\)](#) or [2094 \(2013\)](#).
